Chair's Report

By now, all of you should have received your San Antonio Annual Meeting preliminary program and registration from SLA. As you can see, this is going to be an excellent meeting in an exciting city and I hope all of you are planning to attend!

The Biological Sciences portion of the meeting consists of four major programs, two field trips and one CE course. The major programs are "Managing Proprietary Scientific Data" which will focus on all types of proprietary scientific data from laboratory notebooks to material safety data sheets to device history records. The speakers are Larry Fogel (BP Research) who has a law degree and an MBA, Eloise Richer from Baxter Pharmaseal who has over twenty years experience managing the Information Center plus Laboratory Notebooks and essential proprietary data for Research and Development Division of Baxter, and Alberta McKay (Glaxo Inc.) who has set up an Optical Storage system to store and disseminate internal documentation such as regulatory submissions and related correspondence, material safety data sheets, research reports, and drug information files, including published literature. The second program deals with "Copyright Access in the 90's." The moderator for this program is Laura Gasaway from the University of North Carolina who has both an MLS and a law degree. The speakers are equally distinguished and include Eamon T. Fennessey from the Copyright Clearance Center and Barrie T. Stern from Adonis. The third program is the "Biennial Toxicology Roundtable" featuring P. Gayle Alston from the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry of the U.S. Public Health Service and Kathy Deck from the CDC. The final program is "Climate Change: Information Response to Global Issues." There are six speakers from a wide variety of fields and this should prove a most informative program.

The field trip to the Southwest Foundation for Biomedical Research is limited to only twenty participants so if you are interested, please sign up immediately. This will be a very special

field trip and I am especially excited that Ann Campbell was able to convince the foundation to allow us to tour. The San Antonio Botanic Gardens are internationally acclaimed. For those of you unfamiliar with arid land plants, the San Antonio Botanic Garden has an entire section devoted exclusively to Texas plants. There is however, one misprint in the program. The greenhouse is the largest underground greenhouse in the Southwest, not the largest underwater greenhouse in the southwest. Both field trips include lunch.

And finally, by popular demand, we have Bonnie Snow to teach her course, "CE 310: Drug and Pharmaceutical Information Resources." The cost of the program includes the purchase of Bonnie's book which will either be sent prior to the class or distributed at the class. Renee Bush will be the moderator for this course and I am certain that many of you have seen Renee's advance advertising.

All of these wonderful programs in an enchanting city. What more could you ask (besides full funding from your institutions!)

The BSD Annual Business Meeting will be held on Tuesday from 4:30-5:30 (just prior to the Margarita Party). I want to urge all members to attend. In the past, we have rarely had more than 10% of our membership in attendance. It is crucial for the health of the division that all members attend and provide input or feedback or some sort of communication so that the division can continue to grow and be relevant to the membership. One major agenda item will be the Long Range Plan for the Division. I feel that it is important for all BSD members to think about this issue and the goals and direction in which you feel the division should be going. A preliminary agenda for this meeting will appear later in this issue.

Gloria Zamora has been appointed as the board member proctor for the Biological Sciences Division. Speaking of the Annual BSD Business Meeting, you will notice that on page 48 of the preliminary program, we are listed as "BIO" not "BSD". This is how I discovered that our acronym had been changed by headquarters. Please keep this new acronym in mind!

Chair's Annual Report

This has been an active and productive year for the Biological Sciences Division. I have received annual reports from each of the committee chairpersons and each of the officers. My Annual Report will be a synopsis of each of theirs with my additional comments.

Cami Loucks, Chair-elect, has done an outstanding job soliciting contributions to support the 1991 Annual Meeting in San Antonio. Cami has contacted a dozen potential sponsors and received firm commitments from eight to date. The amounts promised vary but the grand total will exceed \$4000.00. Cami is already well along in her planning for the 1992 program in San Francisco. She has found some co-sponsors and also has a couple of good program topics. Cami's other major contributions this year has been to start working with Kurt Baumgartner, *Biofeedback* Business Manager, to increase advertising for Biofeedback and fund raising in general for the division.

Rita Fisher is Secretary/Treasurer. The minutes for the Division Annual Meeting in Pittsburgh were published in a recent issue of our division newsletter, *Biofeedback*. Rita prepared the division's 1990 Annual Financial Statement and as of 12/31/90, the division had \$8,356.90. As of 5/1/91, our current balance is \$14,100.

Anna McGowan, Past Chair, has not had an opportunity to rest on her laurels and has instead been quite busy working on the Long Range Plan (with Director Jane Cole), submitting accepted Division By-Laws revisions to Association headquarters, and revising the Division Procedures Manual. Anna has completed all of the preliminary work on the By-Laws and we are in the process of sending the revisions to the BSD membership. The membership must have the revisions 30 days in advance of the business meeting where these revisions will be voted on. Anna has made a great deal of progress on the Long Range Plan and the Procedures Manual. She has also been a source of support and wisdom to me during my years as chair-elect and chair.

Jane Cole, Director, has been working on the Long Range Plan. She and Anna McGowan have prepared a Preliminary Draft: Long Range Plan and Division Goals, Short Term to be presented to the BSD Executive Board and at the BSD Annual Business Meeting.

Caroline Morris, Archives, is still organizing the archives received between last year's annual meeting and the present. She is preparing a more complete report for the Annual Business Meeting.

Steven Sowell, Biofeedback Editor, has done his usual outstanding job putting together our division newsletter. Adam Schiff has also continued as Assistant Editor and Kurt Baumgartner as Business Manager. Four issues of Biofeedback have been published this year (v.15, #4 - v.16, #3). Pages per issue ran from 8 - 14 pages with a total page count of 44 for the year. This is an increase of 6 pages over last year. We had one page of advertising in v.15, #4 due to Anna McGowan's efforts last year. Steven met two of his goals for this year: the image of Biofeedback has been improved by printing the issues on a laser printer and more topical articles have been included in each issue. Steven's third goal, which is to increase advertising revenue to cover 25% of the cost of each issue, needs further discussion and will be an agenda item at our annual Executive Board Meeting.

Karen Patrias again served as our division Consultant. Karen had one request for information and the interaction went smoothly. Karen will prepare an article or an ad for *Biofeedback* in the near future to make all division members aware of this service.

Kay Collins was the division's new Government Relations Chair. Kay reports that the important bills and regulations pending last year have not been passed or approved. With the elections, nothing new has been introduced. This year, only Senator Gore's bill on NREN is pending. The Office of Management and Budget has again announced its intent to revise Circular A-130 concerning government publication definitions and distributions. Kay feels that even though no library related legislation passed last year, it was still made clear what the new issues of the 1990's are: distribution of more government information through electronic formats (CD ROM, online bulletin boards, diskettes etc.); what costs will be shifted to libraries and to users; and how much

government information will be given to private publishers to "enhance" so it can then be copyrighted and sold to the public and to libraries.

Virginia Lingle served as our new Membership Chair. Virginia reports that as of 4/1/91 our membership stands at 633 members, but membership fluctuates greatly (on 3/14/91 we had a high of 696 members.) Virginia and her committee (Mae Cutler, Susan Lake, Jeffrey Wehmeyer, Margaret Welshmer and John Sisson) sent welcoming letters and an invitation to submit a profile of themselves and their libraries for inclusion in Biofeedback to 99 new or newly transferred members. Over 66 dropped members were contacted to ascertain why they left the division. Membership information, new member information, two librarian profiles and information on over 155 address and/or telephone changes were also submitted to Biofeedback. Letters encouraging attendance at the annual meeting were sent to over 60 student members in the division. The committee is also working on a questionnaire to ascertain why members leave the division.

Carolyn Dodson served as chair of the Nominations & Elections Committee. We are currently holding elections for incoming Chair-Elect and for Director. An excellent slate of candidates was prepared by Carolyn and committee members Susan Curtis and Lucy Rowland. Election results should be available by May 27th so that winners can be notified and new committee chairs appointed as needed before the Annual Meeting. A new time line for nominations and elections has been prepared for next year so that we have election results earlier.

Ann Campbell again served as Chair of the Professional Development/Programs Committee. Ann and her hardworking committee (Jack Cooper, Wei Wei, Judy Wojcik, Renee Bush and Larry Wright) have been very active this year and they have been an enormous help to me in the planning and preparations for the Annual Meeting. PD/PC planned and will moderate three events for the 1991 San Antonio Annual Meeting. Jack Cooper and Wei Wei arranged for the botanical gardens tour and Jack will moderate. Judy Wojcik and Renee Bush arranged and publicized the continuing education course on pharmacology sources and Renee will moderate. Ann arranged and will moderate the tour of the Southwest Foundation for Biomedical Research. The committee plans to re-survey division members in mid to late 1991 about programs, courses and tours for the Cincinnati (1993), Atlanta (1994) and Montreal

(1995) annual meetings. Larry Wright developed the new survey and will present it at the BSD Annual Business Meeting.

Janice Kemp was our new Chair for Public Relations/Career Guidance. Janice and her committee (Barry Brown, Katherine Hart, Stephen Macksey and Lucy Rowland) sent award announcements for the BSD Student Conference Award (an essay) in early January to student group faculty advisors and to ALA accredited library school administrators. Three entries were received by the March 15 deadline. Sheri Tickle Hester of the University of Tennessee, Knoxville was the successful entrant. Janice reports that in view of the small number of applicants, the committee plans to review the procedures used and to make recommendations to next year's committee.

Mary Compton chaired the Publications
Committee again this year and due to her efforts,
BSD participated in the SLA publication, Tools of the
Profession. Mary Compton was the Coordinator/Editor
and co-compilers were Elisabeth Davis, Adam Schiff,
Tracey Powell and Linda Ordogh. Each of these
co-compilers were assigned a biology subdiscipline
and compiled a bibliography of reference tools used
in that sub-discipline. The Publications Committee
also published two lists in Biofeedback based on BSD
member publications. Karen Bledsoe is looking into
BSD sponsoring an issue of Special Libraries.

Three division members attended the Midwinter Meeting in Washington D.C.: Chair Barbara Montanary-Schader, Chair-Elect Cami Loucks, and Past Chair Anna McGowan.

Ann Juneau of the National Museum of Natural History Library has been working on putting together a Natural History caucus or special interest group under the auspices of the BSD. Ann published the minutes of the Natural History Interest Group meeting in Pittsburgh at the 1990 Annual Meeting and Ann has also sent out a questionnaire to possible members. Ann will report on the current status of this group at the 1991 BSD Annual Business Meeting.

I have spent my year planning for the San Antonio meeting. BSD will be co-sponsoring four programs: Managing Proprietary Scientific Data, Copyright and Access in the '90s, Toxicology Roundtable, and Climate Change: Information Response to Global Issues. We are also sponsoring two field trips: Southwest Foundation for Biomedical Research and the Botanic Gardens.


